COUNCIL MEETING AGENDA NOTES September 8, 2020

- 1. The meeting will be called to order by Mayor Deb De Haan at 4:30 o'clock P.M.
- 2. Opening ceremonies. Pledge of Allegiance to our flag and a moment of silent prayer.
- 3. The agenda was prepared, posted and distributed in accordance with requirements of the Iowa Open Meeting Act.
- 4. This time is provided for citizen comments. It is suggested that if someone wishes to speak, we also ask for their residence. This time is intended for residents in the City limits.
- 5. The minutes of the August 17, 2020 council meeting are enclosed for your review. Exhibit 1
- 6. An Ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances of the City of Orange City, by amending Title 11, Article #17, Section 4: Nonconforming Structures for the addition of Section E: Exception for existing Single-Family Residential Dwellings. By amending the code, it would allow residential properties to construct additions to their homes. Exhibit 2
- 7. This is the published time and place to hold a public hearing on the request to change Property Zoning. Request has been made by Dutch Holdings, LLC to re-zone the property from R-1/Low Density Residential to R-2, Medium/ High Density Residential. Planning and Zoning Commission is recommending to the City Council to approve the re-zoning. Exhibit 3
- 8. Resolution approving and authorizing a request for reimbursement from the Iowa Covid-19 Government Relief Fund for eligible costs related to the Covid-19 public health emergency. This allows the city to receive up to a maximum of \$146,924.90 from the State as part of the federal CARES Act. The first submission to the State will be for costs incurred from March 1, 2020 thru July 31, 2020. A second reimbursement will be submitted in October for costs incurred from August 1 thru September 30, 2020. Exhibit 4
- 9. The City of Orange City is proposing to purchase the MOC/FV school district bus barn. The reason for the purchase is to gain control of all the property in that area and along Highway 10 in order to create a commercial lot. OCDC currently owns the property directly to the south of the bus barn. The City currently owns the property north of the bus barn. By making the purchase we will be able to create a 3.6 acre commercial lot that we will be able to make available for sale. The price for the bus barn property is \$225,000. Conditions of the sale are that the School district will be able to maintain possession until 02/15/2021. Additionally, OCDC will work with the school district to construct and lease a new bus facility at Industrie Centrum. The goal will be to complete the transaction by 09/30/2020 and OCDC to begin construction on a new bus facility as soon as practical. Exhibit 5
- 10. Bryan Wells from DGR has been leading the efforts to complete the 28E Agreement between the City of Orange City, MOC-FV Schools, and Sioux County for the shared development of infrastructure for the elementary school project. The agreement defines what costs are applied to each agency, including Jay Avenue and Highway 10 turn lanes, Jay Avenue paving, storm sewer, utility services, 14th Street paving, and site development. Brad De Jong has reviewed the agreement.

- 11. To complete the sale of 38 acres of farm ground for the elementary school site, the City needs to hold a public hearing and approve the sale of the property. This resolution would set the public hearing for the September 21, 2020 City Council meeting.
- 12. There has been a committee working to recommend a firm to assist the City of Orange City create a Community Growth and Development Plan. Orange City is at a critical stage in the community's growth. We believe that it is necessary to confirm our community vision and set priorities for growth. This will allow us to focus our efforts, maximize partnerships and leverage resources. The City of Orange City is seeking the services of a firm to assist with a City-wide community visioning and Master Land Use Plan development process. The firm hired will provide consulting services to lead an extensive, inclusive, and innovative community engagement process to develop a master plan that identifies community values, milestones, and prioritized implementation steps to achieve a viable, sustainable, and accessible community. Proposals should include a strong emphasis on creative, strategic approaches to issues faced by the City, and include clear goals and implementable action strategies. There was a request for proposal that was sent to ten firms. Five firms responded to the proposal. The 6 person selection committee narrowed down the choices to two firms and interviewed those two. The selection committee would like to make a recommendation to the City Council to select ISG as the firm to assist Orange City through this process. If approved, we anticipate the process would begin in late September and be complete by the end of spring of 2021.
- 13. Preston DeBoer presented a proposal for the City Council to consider that would extend the current Collective Bargaining Agreement through June 30, 2022. All elements of the agreement would be approved for an additional calendar year, and employees would receive a 2.75% wage increase.
- 14. Harold Hoftyzer resigned from the Planning and Zoning Commission on 6-9-20. Terry Hofmeyer is willing to fill the vacated position with the Mayors recommendation to Council for final approval.
- 15. We have received a renewal application for a Class C Liquor License as submitted by Downtown Grille. Everything is in order.
- 16. The Community Betterment Board met on September 2, 2020. There are two recommendations being brought to you from the board. They are \$20,000 towards entrance signage and landscape improvements around Landsmeer Trail and Dunlop Trail. The Parks Department will also provide some benches, shade structures and trees along the Dunlop Wildlife Trail. The second recommendation is the annual lease of the highway billboard signage with Avery Brothers for \$14,550. The Betterment board is working with Avery on doing a refresh of the panels/wraps due to fading. They were last done in 2016.

Set Public Hearing on Rezoning of Property: A motion was made by Council member Rod De Boer and duly seconded by Council member Aaron Beadner setting 4:30 o'clock P.M. on September 8, 2020 as the time for a public hearing to consider the rezoning of Dutch Holdings, LLC property at 602 and 604 2nd Street SE and 601 3rd Street SE from R-1/Low Density Residential to R-2, Medium/High Density Residential. Council member Steve Roesner entered the meeting at 4:47 o'clock P.M.

Employee Picnic: A motion was made by Council member Rod De Boer and duly seconded by Council member Daron De Jong approving to hold an employee picnic and give a gift of appreciation. On call of the roll motion carried. The vote was as follows: AYES: Rod De Boer, Daron De Jong, Aaron Beadner, Steve Roesner; NAYS: None.

Northern Natural Gas Additional Capacity: Earlier this summer we were able to acquire 149 Dth/day of additional capacity on the NNG pipeline, we had requested 700 Dth/day. This capacity came at no capital cost. Since there were additional requests for capacity than was available, NNG is looking to make improvements to their system to provide this capacity. They have determined that the additional 551 Dth/day will cost \$352,000. While this cost is certainly higher than the previous capacity, it is low compared to other projects they have undertaken. Steve questioned the demand driving the need for the increased capacity and the payback calculation. Matt responded when it is extremely cold everyone's usage is up; a couple of the larger users are Smithfield and Vogel's. The capacity must be there even if we only need one therm of the extra capacity. This project will go online November 2023. A motion was made by Council member Daron De Jong and duly seconded by Council member Rod De Boer approving to proceed with the process to purchase the additional 551 Dth/day. On call of the roll motion carried. The vote was as follows: AYES: Daron De Jong, Rod De Boer, Aaron Beadner, Steve Roesner; NAYS: None.

ORDINANCE NO. 821

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ORANGE CITY, IOWA, BY AMENDING TITLE 11, ZONING REGULATIONS, ARTICLE #17/ NONCONFORMITIES.

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Orange City, Iowa:

TITLE 11. AMEND ARTICLE #17, SECTION 4: NONCONFORMING STRUCTURES. The Code of Ordinances of the City of Orange City, Iowa, is amended by adding Section 4(E)) and adopting the following wording stated as follows:

SECTION 4: NONCONFORMING STRUCTURES. Where a lawful structure exists at the effective date of adoption or amendment of this ordinance that could not be built under the terms of this ordinance by reason of restrictions on area, lot coverage, height, yards or other characteristics of the structure or its location on the lot, such structure may be continued so long as it remains otherwise lawful, subject to the following provisions:

E. Exception for Existing Single Family Residential Dwellings: Existing, legally established, non-conforming single-family residential dwellings located in non-single family residential zoned districts may make alterations, construct additions to the dwelling so long as they meet the R-1, Low-Density Residential Districts setback regulations and no additional dwelling units are constructed or created. Construction of the dwelling shall start within six (6) months of its approved building permit and shall be completed within one-year of the start of construction. This exception does not apply to mobile homes.

SECTION 2. REPEALER. All ordinance or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudges invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

RESOLUTION NO. 9-8-2020-1917 RESOLUTION REQUESTING REIMBURSEMENT FROM THE IOWA COVID-19 GOVERNMENT RELIEF FUND

A resolution by the City of Orange City to request reimbursement for eligible costs related to the COVID-19 public health emergency from the Iowa COVID-19 Government Relief Fund.

WHEREAS, the United States Congress approved the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act to provide economic relief related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

WHEREAS, Governor Kim Reynolds allocated \$125 million of the State of Iowa's CARES Act funding to local governments for direct expenses incurred in response to the COVID-19 emergency.

WHEREAS, local government funding reimbursements may only be used for necessary expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic, were not accounted for in the current fiscal year city budget, were incurred during the time period of March 1, 2020 through December 30, 2020 and have not been reimbursed from other sources.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the City of Orange City requests reimbursement of \$146,924.90 in eligible expenditures in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City of Orange City affirms that the above requests for reimbursement follow all formal published Federal and State of Iowa guidance on how the funds should be spent, and understand if the reimbursements are misrepresented, the local government will be liable for any applicable penalty and interest.
