- 1. The meeting will be called to order by Mayor Deb De Haan at 4:30 o'clock P.M.
- 2. Opening ceremonies. Pledge of Allegiance to our flag and a moment of silent prayer.
- 3. The agenda was prepared, posted and distributed in accordance with requirements of the Iowa Open Meeting Act.
- 4. This time is provided for citizen comments. It is suggested that if someone wishes to speak, we also ask for their residence. This time is intended for residents in the City limits.
- 5. The minutes of the March 15, 2021 council meeting are enclosed for your review. Exhibit 1
- 6. This is the published time and place to hold a public hearing before considering approval of the proposed disposal of the lots in the Puddle Jumper Trail 10th Addition and resolution to accept the disposal.
- 7. Joe Ivy resigned from the Planning and Zoning Commission on 1-7-21. Ashley Saras is willing to fill the vacated position with the Mayors recommendation to Council for final approval.
- 8. City Council needs to set the date of May 3, 2021 for a public hearing for the thirteen (13) parcels applying for an 80/20 voluntary annexation to the City of Orange City.
- 9. We have received the contract and bond of Vander Pol Excavating for the Orange City, MOC-FV Street Improvements project and recommend approval.
- 10. DGR has been working on the plans and specs for the Nassau Lift Station Improvements and sending them out to contractors this week, with the bid letting on April 30. In preparation for this, we need to set a public hearing for the May 3, 2021 council meeting.
- 11. First Reformed Church is requesting a fireworks display permit for Saturday, May 8 to celebrate their 150 year anniversary. They want to set them off in the Unity Christian High School parking lot. They are working with Denny Vander Wel for the location approval and Van Engelenhoven Agency will work with them on insurance requirements.
 - Roy Nielsen is also requesting a fireworks display permit for Friday, May 14 (rain date is Saturday, May 15) during Tulip Festival. They will set them off in the area of 1701 Frankfort Place SE. They have worked with Denny Vander Wel for the location approval and Van Engelenhoven Agency will work with them on insurance requirements.
- 12. The Community Betterment Board met on March 31, 2021. There are two recommendations being brought to you from the board. They are \$15,000 towards maintenance items at the Orange City Daycare Building. The items consist of carpet replacement from 2006, replacing shades for the windows, and some repair costs for the elevator. The daycare is a necessary tool for local employers. It struggles with cashflow and deems these upgrades are necessary for the building. The total cost of the project is estimated to be around \$45,000. The second recommendation is for

13. MidAmerican Energy is the electric provider for most of the residential lots in the Puddle Jumper 10th Addition. In order to install the electric infrastructure in this area, MidAmerican requires a refundable capital payment in the amount of \$21,413.30. As homes are built, this amount is refunded to the City. This situation is similar to the Industrie Centrum #7 development that we discussed last fall.
