tree ordinance update

The city recently updated its Code of Ordinances, a practice that regularly happens every few years. As part of this process, the tree ordinance has been updated to clarify the responsibility for trees that are in the street right-of-way (the 10-20ft beyond the curb, typically between the street and the sidewalk). Below are the key parts of the ordinance.

- Homeowners should keep trees trimmed to a height of 15ft over the street and 8ft over the sidewalk.
- Trees that are damaged by wind or other weather are the responsibility of the homeowner to clean up and take away. City staff will assist with pushing debris from the roadway to minimize the impact on traffic. On occasion, as in the past with large damaging wind events, the city will coordinate curb pick up and disposal sites.
- Removal of dangerous, dying, or unhealthy trees and branches is the responsibility of the homeowner.

construction update - gelderland addition

Work continues to progress on the Gelderland Addition, the new residential subdivisionaround the new MOC/FV elementary school. Paving of 14th St SE has recently been completed with the sidewalk and final grading underway. The 25 residential lots will be going on the market September 6.

2021 property tax rate due 2022-2023

Orange City's total property tax levy rate ranks 564th in the state compared to the other 940 lowa communities. Property taxes due in 2022-2023 decreased to a rate of \$32.03/\$1,000 in comparison to \$32.30 (563rd rank in 2021-2022).

In the Northwest Iowa survey below, three communities lowered their "city" property tax mill levy rate. Five were unchanged and one increased. The City of Orange City has been fortunate to manage it's operating costs guite effectively while making prudent capital investments.

The survey's combined mill levy rate averaged \$32.76 compared to Orange City's \$32.03.
