home energy assistance program

The Low-income Home Energy Assistance Program (LiHEAP), offered through Mid-Sioux Opportunity, Inc., may be able to help you pay your winter heating bill. This program is funded through the lowa Department of Health and Human Services and has been established to help qualified low-income lowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs.

Your local Mid-Sioux office will be taking applications from November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025. Each applicant will need to furnish a copy of their most recent heating and electric bill; original Social Security or I-94 card for each household member; and proof of the

household's income for the past month (4 weeks), the past twelve (12) months, or most recent tax return. Eligibility for participation is established according to the federal income guidelines listed in the chart above. Applicants eligible for an award will be paid on a first come, first served basis, and all payments are subject to availability of funds.

water service line material inventory

The US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), with the assistance of the Iowa DNR, has instituted each public water supply to create an inventory of every service line and the material of which it is made. This rule relates to the potential dangers of lead service lines experienced by some US cities, such as Flint, MI. The City of Orange City has been noting service line material over the last few years as water meters have been replaced and as new homes have been constructed. Fortunately, we have found no lead services thus far, and believe there are minimal, if any, lead services in our system. Once the inventory is complete, each community must develop a plan to eliminate and replace all lead services. Over the next few months, we will be contacting the property owners whose lines are unknown in an effort to complete the service line inventory.
